Discussions this week within our school community prompted one parent to reflect on privilege, particularly white privilege. She sent this to us and we thought it would be helpful to share with you:

'Privilege - to have an advantage, or immunity or something only available to a particular person or group. So what is White privilege?

During the past few weeks I have witnessed the term white privilege being completely misunderstood, many times. Facebook posts such as "I work two jobs just to pay my rent and make ends meet; I'm not suffering from white privilege." "I don't understand that people don't feel equal when it seems to me, in my work and everywhere I go, that it's so diverse and I never come across racism".

And "There's no racism in this village".

The fact that many of us rarely come across racism, witness it, or experience it, IS white privilege.

A white family is unlikely to experience walking round a department store with the security guard following them. A white family will never walk into a country pub for Sunday lunch and feel uncomfortable knowing they are being stared at because of skin colour. Or walk into a car showroom as a family and have the salesman walk right by them and pounce on the white family that enters 2 minutes later. You will never have to hear your partner explaining, when met by a professional, to be interviewed for a senior position, that the interviewer was surprised they are black, as they have such an English sounding name.

As a white woman, I had never experienced any of these situations either. But over the past decade or so, since married to a mixed heritage husband, I've witnessed all of these events and others, first hand.

These experiences have taught me what white privilege is.'
